A MESSAGE FROM COUNCIL PRESIDENT VAL BACH

As I write this message, Holy Week is less than a week out and I find myself reminiscing about some of the most heartfelt memories of Good Friday and Easter worship. There are always a few songs that really resonate with me during this time because when I hear these songs, I literally get goose bumps. I picture in my mind the pain and suffering that Jesus endured as he carried his own cross, the cross that he was nailed to, the cross that he died on, and then the utter amazement and joy that his resurrection brought to everyone back then, but even more importantly to us today. These are my favorite songs from the Lenten and Easter season:

Good Friday:

- The Old Rugged Cross
- Were You There
- Amazing Grace

Easter Sunday:

- Christ the Lord is Risen Today
- King of Kings .
- Amazing Grace

Notice that Amazing Grace is listed for both the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus Christ. During our worship service on March 17, Saige Fettes and Lindsay Kahn shared with us the meaning and history behind this song. Then to top it off, they beautifully sang it for us. Such an appropriate song for so many occasions. And all it takes to get goose bumps from these songs is for you to listen to the powerful words and think about their true meaning.

I think back to a typical Good Friday service from years back at my former church where Gene Polzin would very somberly read the story of Jesus' crucifixion from up in the balcony of our church with all the lights off. At the end of the reading, with the church being completely dark and so quiet that you could hear a pin drop, he would say in a loud, commanding voice..."It is Finished" and loudly closed the Bible shut. Those words and the echo of the Bible closing were so moving. We would all then walk out of church without saying a word; leaving us all thinking about how Jesus suffered for us, enduring such pain, and eventually taking his last breath leaving everyone with a great sense of sadness and loss. But then, when we returned on Easter Sunday (we always went to the 6:00 a.m. sunrise service), the mood was anything but somber. The music was joyous, trumpets blaring. This was a day to celebrate, because Jesus had risen for us so that we would have ever-lasting life! Alleluia. (continued on page 2)

The Lenten and Easter season is always a time where I count my blessings. God chose US. He gave His only Son to die for US. And because of this great sacrifice, you and I are blessed with the gift of eternal life. We just need to believe and repent our sins. How amazing! And each time we partake in the sacraments of Holy communion, we are reminded of our sins being washed away because of Jesus' sacrificing <u>His</u> body and shedding <u>His</u> blood for <u>US</u>. What a privilege we've been given.

March is also a month where I think of yet another way in which I have been blessed. God gave my family our special little girl, Laynee. Laynee has Down syndrome. Trisomy 21 is the most typical form of Down syndrome. About 95% of people with Down syndrome have Trisomy 21. With this type of Down syndrome, each cell in the body has 3 separate copies of chromosome 21 instead of the usual 2 copies—thus the reason 3-21 is recognized as National Down Syndrome Awareness Day each year.

I attended a Down syndrome bowling event in Wausau with my daughter and her family a couple weeks ago. It was truly amazing to see so many people coming together for this same great reason. And, St. Paul's very own Machon family can bowl! Tina, Jack, Owen and Emmet bowled in the lanes next to us showing all of us just how it's done.

Be sure to count your blessings. Not just during Easter, but every day. There are many!

Wishing you all a wonderful Easter and hoping you and your families can join St. Paul's for Easter breakfast at 8:00 a.m. and for worship following breakfast. Join in the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ! Alleluia! He is Risen!

The Mobile Food Pantry served 86 households on March 21, 2024.

43 individuals ages 0-17

83 individuals ages 18-59

74 individuals ages 60+

200 total number of individuals

The next Mobile Food Pantry will be on Thursday, March 21. Volunteers meet at 1:00 p.m. Distribution begins at 4:00 p.m.

There were 39 individuals visiting the pantry for the first time.

Feed My People delivered 3,655 pounds of the following food: cheese, cottage cheese, baked beans, yogurt, bread, mac and cheese, cereal, canned vegetables, oatmeal, turkey, chicken, chips, bananas, oranges, salad kits, ice cream, canned beef ravioli, cauliflower, onions, frozen strawberries, peanut butter, and crackers.

A MESSAGE FROM BARB KRUG (SAM)

Based on a True Story

I must have had too much time on my hands this past week. I went to see two movies. Both were based on true stories: "Ordinary Angels" and "Arthur the King." The movies were very good and showed me, the viewer, things that have happened that I may not have seen or experienced. This got me thinking about the Bible and how it is based on a True Story. I have a friend at Lay School who has said numerous times, that the Bible is just a book of stories and things may not have actually happened that way. Just like any story based on truth, the writers may change some events to make it more reader or viewer friendly. However, from 2 Timothy 3:16 we know, "All scripture is inspired by God." The Greek word for "inspired" could be literally translated "God-breathed." God has intended and inspired every word of Scripture. He is the primary author of the Bible. And yet, God used human authors as the agents through which He has written the Bible. Throughout the years, the translations may have used different words, but the God-breathed inspiration remains the same. The story hasn't been changed for the reader or the viewer. Even though the reader may view the words differently.

There are numerous movies about various Biblical stories. I enjoy watching many of them, but I struggle watching any movie depicting the crucifixion of our Lord. The pain and suffering endured by Jesus, for us, is difficult for me to watch. The pounding of the hammer on the nails in Jesus' hands and feet is more than I can bear. I comprehend the pain Jesus endured for us. I am thankful to Him for enduring it for us and our salvation, I just don't like to watch it. Knowing that He endured it for us, and we continue to sin against Him, is difficult for me to confess. I could watch movies of His glorious resurrection all day long and try to forget about the pain, but that wouldn't really be the True Story. True Stories aren't always easy stories to tell or hear or think about.

Our True Story isn't all glorious days. There are days of pain and suffering. There are days of illness and distress. But the True Story of Jesus Christ is part of our True Story and He will always be with us, strengthening us, comforting us, healing us, forgiving us, and loving us. Make your True Story as glorious as you can!

Alleluia. Christ is risen (for us). He is risen indeed!


NEEDLES FOR NEEDS

You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. John 15:16 (NRSV)

Showy or Quiet

In all families, there are those who attract a lot of attention and those who are quiet and less showy. The trillium family has quite a number of different kinds of plants in its family. The less showy Nodding Trillium is less likely to draw attention as people pass by. It is not likely to be chosen first by people who want to add new flowers to their gardens. If it could express feelings, it might be those of a child who is not chosen first by friends. Yet, in a world where it relates to insects that come to pollinate, it is not less important. Insects readily find it and in late summer it produces a large, beautiful fruit. It has a special place of importance.

Often we judge by outward appearances and beauty. The Bible tells us that the fruits Christians bear are important. Are there people who do not work in a showy manner and yet produce much fruit in the kingdom of God?

Church Council Meeting Wednesday, March 13, 2024

Meeting was called to order at 6:06 p.m. - after a picture was taken with the representatives from the CARE program receiving the portion of scrip proceeds designated to them.

Council members present: Val Bach, Leon Gasek, Kathy Hackbarth, Tony Schumacher, Marie Koerner, Dan Higgins, Carrie Zirngible and Gail Heurung.

Guests present: Nancy Jones and Barb Krug.

Barb Krug provided the opening prayer.

Motion by Gail, seconded by Dan to accept the meeting agenda. Motion carried. Motion by Marie, seconded by Tony to accept the council minutes from February. Motion carried.

<u>Business</u>

Treasurer's report: New line item pointed out – Interest Income – from using our new interest-bearing checking account. Wages will no longer be shown on the expense report. It is now a line item in the total because the Joint Treasurer will be paying all the wages. Motion to accept the report by Leon, seconded by Gail. Motion Carried.

Financial Secretary report: No new things to report.

Barb Krug report: Brought up the Wonderful Worth of Woman Retreat and the Spring Rally. Discussed a request to help with the fees for those who may struggle to pay the registration. A motion by Gail, seconded by Marie to fund assistance up to \$200 with a maximum of \$25 per person for people to attend who are members of the church. Motion carried.

Worship team: A concern was expressed by a member regarding no Good Friday services. We will publish available services in the area and revisit this for next year.

Sunday School is still going strong.

Confirmation has two more regular sessions, and one with Bishop Laurie. Confirmation set for May 5, 2024. First Communion class is set for April 10, with First Communion set for April 21.

Bible study: The adult Bible study still has two sessions remaining. A new session (How Lutherans should use the Bible) will be video based. More information will be coming, but it will possibly begin in May.

Easter breakfast should be set.

Synod Assembly will be June 7 and 8. Still looking for a man and a woman from St. Paul's to attend.

Roof repairs: There was a brief discussion on the roof repairs. Val will call Heidi to clarify a couple of things. The Council will look at roof colors and get it picked after the meeting.

Ladies Lunch Bunch will have their rummage sale on May 9 to 11.

Joint Parish update: Looking for someone to fill the Treasurer's position. Brenda Nernberger will continue for now to help out. They are exploring the hiring of an outside party as well.

5th Sunday joint worship: Easter will be at each individual church. Breakfast will be at 6:30 at Our Savior's and 8:00 at St. Paul's. We will continue to pin down options for the June 30' joint service – scheduled at St. Paul's. Ice Cream Social perhaps? We will look at this more in the coming months.

Compensation for lay people leading worship: A motion by Tony, seconded by Leon, to pay lay people, not members of St. Paul's a stipend of \$75 in conjunction with the policy that Our Saviour's has in place. Motion carried.

A suggestion from a member to talk to new confirmands about Simply Giving and envelope giving to the church.

Next meeting is set for April 10th at 6:00 p.m.

Motion by Gail, second by Kathy to adjourn...motion carried.

The council closed with the Lord's Prayer.
