A MESSAGE FROM COUNCIL PRESIDENT VAL BACH

God's Blessings and Happy New Year!

2024 is now officially off and running! The Council has been busy focusing on budget preparation, annual reports, recruiting a new Council member to fill the open position created with Sally Lemke's ending term, and reflecting on what was a very successful year in many ways.

A huge shout out to Sally Lemke for all that she does for St. Paul's and her commitment during her past terms on Council. We appreciate all that you have contributed and all that you continue to contribute. Thank you!

2023 was good year for St. Paul's in many ways. Our congregation, while being without a full-time pastor, has shown all of us that our church and our members make St. Paul's a wonderful extension of God's mission. We have seen an increase in weekly attendance and more involvement overall. St. Paul's is a group of people who have come together as a family, feeding off each other and our beliefs. Along with God's guidance, we continue to grow in our faith and leadership. What a perfect time to toot our own horns (since we did just ring in the new year)! Well done, members of St. Paul's.

2024 has also brought with it an unfortunate situation several of us have recently faced. Many of our Council members (and perhaps others in our congregation) have received text messages or emails that appear to be coming from Pastor Nancy, Pastor Bob or Pastor Rodger. The communications are asking for help in purchasing some gift cards for people who are in the hospital facing cancer treatment. Of course, these requests pull at our heartstrings as they appear to be generated from leaders of the church (people we trust) and involve a devastating circumstance we all empathize with. It is our suspicion that these impersonators/scam artists have accessed our contact information from the newsletter publications available on our website. I have reported this matter to the Synod knowing that if this is happening to our church members, it could very well be happening to others.

During 2023 I was asked to be the representative for St. Paul's on the Community Mission with Jesus (CMWJ), a local mission program that was created by several members of Our Saviour's and has expanded to include members of several local churches. I must admit that when Teresa Gretzinger (such a warm and compassionate woman that I am honored to have gotten to know) called and asked me to be on their committee as a

Children are such a blessing, until you have an evening planned to sit and read. Getting asked the question, from child number 2 "are you busy tonight?" Well...... yes and no. 



Community United Church of Medford will host this year's World Day of Prayer service on Friday, March 1, beginning at 6:00 p.m.

World Day of Prayer is a worldwide ecumenical movement of Christian women of many traditions who come together to observe a common day of prayer each year on the first Friday in March. Each year a different country serves as the writer of the World Day of Prayer worship service. For 2024, the Christian Women of Palestine developed the



theme, "I beg you . . . bear with one another in Love," from Ephesians 4: 1-3. A free will offering will go toward the work of World Day of Prayer.

Both men and women are invited to this ecumenical service.

We are still meeting every Tuesday from 9:00 a.m.—2:00 p.m., so please come join us for fun and fellowship while we work.

As always, we would be grateful for donations of cotton and cotton-poly blend flat sheets - full size and larger. We take older and new sheets and turn them into backs for our quilts. We recently received word that microfiber sheets are not desirable for the quilts, so we had to get rid of a few of our sheets in inventory. We could also use some embroidery floss - we need approximately 5 skeins per quilt.

The Mobile Food Pantry served 75 households on January 18, 2023.

Feed My People delivered 2,324 pounds of the following food: ground beef, pork sausage, oatmeal, cheddar cheese, processed cheese, yogurt, frozen entrees, cottage cheese, onions, canned vegetables, soup broth, fresh produce, crackers, and bread.

Starflower Trientalis borealis



In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." Matthew 2:1-2

"It is I, Jesus, who sent my angel to you with this testimony for the churches. I am the root and descendant of David, the bright morning star." Revelation 22:16 (NRSV)

Promises Fulfilled

Stars remind us of promises made and promises fulfilled. Long ago people waited for the prophesy of the Messiah to be fulfilled. The wise men from the East studied the stars and followed the star that was a sign that the king of the Jews had been born. They came to worship Jesus. In the book of Revelation Jesus speaks and says he has fulfilled the hopes and dreams of prophets through the ages. He is the "bright morning star" or the Messiah for whom people have waited.

In spring we wait for promised new wildflowers to appear. What is a Stockbox?

A **Stockbox** is a free monthly box of healthy food that includes cereal, milk, canned veggies and fruit, pasta or rice, protein, fruit juice, canned meats and two pounds of fresh Wisconsin cheese.

How do I qualify for a Stockbox? You must be 60 years or older with a monthly income of \$1580.00 or less per month (\$2,137.00 for a two-person household.)

How will I receive the Stockbox? Pick-up of the **Stockbox** by you or a proxy (date, time, and location to be determined.)

Please let the Taylor County Commission on Aging know if you are interested and qualify for the **Stockbox** program by calling **715-748-1491**. If there is enough interest in the program, the Hunger Task Force team can make Taylor County a drop-off location.

Guests Present: Nancy Jones, Tina Dassow and Interim Barb Krug.

Meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by President Val Bach. Barb Krug led the group in an opening prayer.

Motion by Dan, seconded by Sally to accept the agenda – motion carried.

Motion by Marie, seconded by Dan to accept the previous month's minutes - motion carried.

Reports:

Treasurer's Report – Year end coming together – info to Leon for budgeting soon. Discussed the bake sale funds, currently in the Event/Fundraiser account. Looking at the ELCA Global Missions Barnyard program. Kathy will work with the children to select what to purchase for the mission project. Motion by Gail, seconded by Carrie to accept the Treasurer's Report – motion carried.

Financial secretary – nothing new to report.

Budget: Leon to continue as soon as he gets the information from Tina.

Annual Meeting – set for February 4. Make sure reports get to Nancy now.

Worship Team: Pulpit supply all set – discussion on Lent services. Will address the Lent and Advent services at the annual meeting to get an idea of want/need for them going forward....but for now, St. Paul's will have an Ash Wednesday service at 12:15 p.m. Our Savior's will be holding Lenten services weekly following their confirmation sessions.

Sunday School is back in session – had a very nice Christmas Program.

Confirmation will be having a parent meeting shortly to discuss dates and things for confirmation. Bishop Laurie is planning to visit with the confirmands as well.

Adult Bible study now has two sessions – Leon will lead the evening one to finish up that series. Kim Gasek leads the morning session and it is going well.

Council: Val reported that Tony Schumacher has agreed to a term on the new council. Thank you to Sally Lemke who will be done on the council. Kathy and Carrie have agreed to another term. Tony and any other candidates will be voted on at the annual meeting on February 4.

Roof Repairs/Gutters: Heidi was not at this meeting but said we would have the figures on the gutters so that they can be addressed at the annual meeting.

Joint Parish Council: Val gave the update on the latest Joint Parish Council meeting. Barb Krug will be taking over as Interim – all documents are signed. This will allow Pastor Bob to retire a bit more but still remain active. Nancy Jones has agreed to take on Our Savior's admin position - hoping to streamline our services to cut down on extra work. Thank you to the Krug family for all their hard planning for the December 31 service that was cancelled due to the weather. Easter's 5th Sunday will not be joint – due to Easter traditions and attendance, each church will have their own services. Leon will check with the confirmation parents to discuss Easter breakfast. Val is willing to coordinate the breakfast that would be held before the church service. The next joint service will be June 30, at St. Paul's. **Emergency contacts list** – Barb will confirm if that is staying the same. Right now it is Pastor Bob, Pastor Nancy and Pastor Elizabeth Biers.

Benevolence: Discussion on the benevolences and determining where the funds are to go and when we need to determine it – beginning of the year or end of the year. Marie will do some checking to see what procedures are expected and or required.

Church cancellation procedure: Nancy asked about who would determine whether or not to cancel services. Right now – it would be up to Val and Mike – two church council Presidents – and Barb Krug, with input from the supply pulpit person.

Community Mission With Jesus: Val discussed the Community Mission With Jesus outreach and the needs that they have...both financial, manpower and committee members. Council will look at this further in the future.

Nancy thanked the council for the Christmas gift received.

Next meeting will be held on February 21 with the regular scheduled being Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday.
