A Message from Pastor Nancy

By the end of 2022, St. Paul's will have recorded 9 baptisms for the year. While that is not a spectacular number, it is significant. In several conversations with Hildegard Kuse, we agreed that the responsibility for supporting the newly baptized extends to the whole community of faith. Yes, it mainly resides with the parents and sponsors, but the congregation answers "We Do" when asked during the baptismal liturgy, "People of God, do you promise to support and pray for them in their new life in Christ?"

Prayers are always welcome. Not only can we pray for the newly baptized, we can pray for the Sunday School and Confirmation leaders. We can pray for guidance in our connection to the young people in the congregation as well as the young children in our immediate families. For the past few months, the confirmation youth have been helping with communion, ushering, and presenting skits. How wonderful to witness such faithbuilding participation!

I want to share one other way in which the congregation supports the newly baptized. In mid-December I mailed a large envelope to each family that had a baptism in 2022. The envelope contained: a Christmas board book titled "God With Us"; a letter from me; a Christmas card with a personal note written by either Tina Machon or Cathy Retzer. Young families are busy. Church strategists tell us that inviting them to some sort of gathering doesn't work because of conflicting schedules. So perhaps receiving a book for them to read to their children is one way we can support the newly baptized.

What better way to begin the new year than to pray for each of the newly baptized? Here are their names: Stella, Kaylor, Henry, Raeyah, Colt, Amelia, Quinn, Lennon, and Coil.

Greetings Everyone,

As I'm writing my message for this month's newsletter, I am looking out my window at the beautiful snow resting on the trees and pretty much covering my outdoor Christmas decorations. God paints us such amazing, postcard-like pictures. Nothing less than impressive; no matter how you look at it.

Along with snowfalls of this magnitude come some challenges...treacherous walking and driving conditions; clearing our sidewalks, driveways and roads; downed power lines; broken tree branches; etc. While sometimes we can't see the beauty of a heavy snowfall because of these challenges, there is always a blessing or two that comes along with it.

With the New Year approaching, many of us make resolutions for moving forward with desired changes or find ourselves reflecting on this past year. It's good to evaluate our past, present and future situation; things change and with those changes come the need to adjust.

St. Paul's and Our Saviour's churches are in the process of doing just that. Reflecting on our past, present and future. Our joint Councils are diligently working through the Synod's recommendations and guidelines for forming a joint parish where each would continue to have our own churches, worship services and finances but with a shared pastor.

We will be voting on the joint parish agreement at a congregational meeting on January 22. I ask that you prayerfully consider the advantages of a joint parish. The old saying "there is power in numbers" most certainly holds true. Consider how much stronger our ministry in our community could be; the excitement of meeting new parishioners during joint events; having optional services to attend; and so many other potential opportunities for growth.

Important Dates to Note – St. Paul's and Our Saviour's Joint Ministry Updates

St. Paul's will hold an informational meeting with the congregation following worship services on **Sunday, January 8th**, to address any questions or concerns the congregation may have with entering into a joint parish agreement with Our Saviour's of Holway.

We will also have a joint meeting of the two councils on **Wednesday, January 18th** at 6:15 p.m. at Our Saviour's to finalize the joint ministry parish agreement. Any members that wish to attend are welcome to do so.

On **January 22, 2023**, we will hold a special congregational meeting to vote on the following resolution including the contents of the finalized joint ministry parish agreement:

"Whereas there is strength in numbers and whereas there is a shortage of ordained pastors; thereby, be it resolved that St. Paul's and Our Saviour's enter into a joint ministry parish agreement as presented to the congregations this day 1/22/2023.

Please mark your calendars with these important dates as we look at the potential future of growing God's ministry within our community.

St. Paul's "Great Flood" – An Unwelcomed Christmas Gift

Christmas morning at St. Paul's was met with an unwanted present. As choir members arrived at church early Christmas day to practice, they were met with a broken water pipe that had flooded the Welcome Hall and two of the three offices as well as the platform by the bathrooms. We also found the main carpeted gathering area in the basement, two of the three Sunday School rooms and the storage closets were also flooded.

With only an hour before worship, we quickly got to work vacuuming up the water to make a path for worshippers to enter in the side door to the right of the altar. Worship went on as usual with Pastor Nancy conducting services minus her robe since that was also wet.

There are several people who deserve a huge thank you. They worked steady for 4-5 hours moving furniture and other wet items, vacuuming up water, coordinating calls and meeting up with Master Clean and Cypher Electric; basically, doing whatever was needed to combat the issue at hand. A big shout out to Sally and Tim Lemke; Pastor Nancy; my husband, Dave Bach; my step-daughter and her boyfriend, Makala Bach and Eli Ruplinger; and my sons-in-law, Matthew Harder and Brock Kalmon. Brock worked diligently to evaluate the repairs needed, removed the cracked coil section while capping off the water source so the water could be turned back on and made sure the boiler system was functional for all zones except the affected area. Certainly, this was not how we thought we'd be spending Christmas day; thank you for all that you did for St. Paul's and for your time spent away from your families.

The new heating coil and parts required for the plumbing repairs are on order and will be installed once they arrive and further research is in progress to determine what caused the coil to break and what needs to be done to prevent this from happening again.

Cypher Electric inspected the electrical panel and confirmed there was no serious damage; but there are several lights that will need to be replaced.

Master Clean came in with commercial grade equipment to remove all remaining water and dry out the church. There is damage to ceiling tiles, insulation that needs to be replaced, drywall to be replaced, spancrete that may be damaged, etc. A full summary of their findings and recommendations will be provided to St. Paul's.

An insurance claim has been filed with Church Mutual; a claims adjuster will be contacting the church office to arrange an appointment to walk through the building. We have \$1,000 deductible; but we believe the plumbing repairs will not be covered by insurance as typically only the damage is covered (not the cause of the damage). This is yet to be confirmed.

Any donations to help cover costs not covered by insurance are certainly welcome. Please be sure to designate the donation to "Water Damage" so it is recorded properly.

Walnut Family Butternut "White Walnut" "Oilnut" (Juglans cinerea)

"Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Luke 12:32-34

What do we treasure? Native plants that provide beauty, food, and variety are a treasure.

The Butternut Tree has oval fruit in fall. Squirrels and people compete for it. Squirrels bury this treasure in the ground and hope to find it later and eat it.

It often takes many years before a tree bears nuts. The compound leaves have a long midrib with several leaflets on each side. These trees produce juglone and the leaves should be kept separate from those used for garden compost. Some plants do not grow well near the tree because of this chemical.



Butternut trees have been dying in the United States because of a fungus called butternut canker. Researchers are taking nuts from healthy trees and planting them in areas not affected by the disease. In this way they hope to save this North American treasure tree.

Examine the bark and look at the branching pattern. If a dead tree has been cut down you can count the rings in the stump to determine how old the tree was. Wood from this kind of tree is also highly prized for furniture and carving. Compare the buds of a Butternut Tree with those of a Black Walnut. Butternut buds form more of a peak than those of the rounded Black Walnut.

What does each of us treasure? We have a treasure in heaven. Jesus has come to give us this treasure. We are to also care for the treasures with which we have been entrusted on this earth. We are to care for the trees that God has created.

Dear Lord, Help us to preserve and protect trees – our national heritage and treasure. Help us to also know that we have a treasure in heaven. In your name we pray, Amen.
