A MESSAGE FROM COUNCIL PRESIDENT VAL BACH

Greetings everyone,

We have an exciting Sunday coming up at St. Paul's on Sunday, October 29. This date is the first official joint worship service held between Our Saviour's and St. Paul's that is being hosted by St. Paul's. What a wonderful way to continue getting to know our partnering parish members. To add to the fun and fellowship of the service and potluck meal following the service, we will be hosting a Trunk or Treat event for the kids right after Sunday School and worship which will take place in the parking lot.

One of the trunk or treat displays I volunteered to create (along with Dave's help, of course) was Noah's Ark – "Saved by God – Just Like You and Me." Noah trusted in God, God kept his promise and Noah and his family along with all the animals were saved from the devastating flood. This is one of my favorite Bible stories.

So, the past couple of days it was "all hands-on deck" literally. My husband and I spent an entire day constructing the front of an ark; one that would fit in the back of his truck. And, of course, we had to build the ramp for the people and animals to get on and off the ark with.

As we were heavy into the construction, I found myself thinking of my dad a lot. He's been gone almost 18 years and was a carpenter who could build anything. Any time that I got an idea in my head to build something, he would take me out to the shop and "we" (or should I say he) would start cutting the wood, nailing it together and by the time we were done we had beautiful pieces of art. One of my most favorite building projects was constructing a vertical plant stand which we used for displaying poinsettias and Easter Lilies. I am so thankful for the time I did have with my dad and all that he taught me in life; including him instilling in me a strong Christian upbringing.

So, even though our angle cuts were far from perfect, and we had a couple we cut wrong more than once, I know he was smiling down as he watched me sketch out the design and measure and mark so Dave could make the cuts and then screw it together.

And, I had lots of help from my grandkids; coloring posters, pairing up sets of stuffed animals for the ark and offering suggestions for what treats they would like. My two 5-year-old grandsons were over Sunday after church and asked what we were building. I told them we're building Noah's Ark, and I reminded them of the story of how God told (continued on page 2)

Noah he needed to take his family and two of every animal onto the ark because there was going to be a great flood and this ark would save them. And I used that opportunity to explain that because Noah trusted God, God saved him and all the animals and that's why we need to love God and trust him always. And remember how amazing God's love is and how powerful it is to put your trust in God.

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR BOB GIESE

Dear members and friends of Our Saviour's/St. Paul's:

Here it is mid-autumn when our thoughts turn to our Thanksgiving celebrations. With that in mind, here is one of my favorite passages about giving thanks: 1 Thessalonians 5:18 - "give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." Notice it does not say "give thanks *for* all circumstances." No, we don't have to be thankful we have cancer or a hip replacement or other traumatic events, though we certainly can be thankful for the miracles of modern medicine which help us to live more productive lives in spite of these problems. But in every situation we find ourselves we can certainly examine our lives to find the blessings we do have from God even in the midst of our struggles and give thanks for those blessings. In fact, studies have shown those who have positive outlooks and can be thankful for what they do have even in the midst of great struggles fare better in the long term than those who only dwell on their problems without seeing the good things in their lives. So, whatever your circumstances you find yourselves in during this season of thanksgiving, I hope you are able to turn your problems over to God, see the blessings you do have, and give God thanks for those blessings.

With that in mind, I want to turn your attention to my favorite passage from the Old Testament and ordination passage: Micah 6:6-8 " "With what shall I come before the Lord, and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?" He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" In my thinking this passage tells us how to best give thanksgiving to God for our blessings. While our words of thanksgiving are important, what their real purpose is is to direct our thoughts outward to the needs around us - in our families, in our church family, in our communities, and in the world.

When we direct our energies (financial, physical, emotional, spiritual) to the people and situations around us where there is need, we are showing we are truly thankful for what God has given us.

So, as you raise your voices in thanks-giving this Thanksgiving, I urge you to think about how you can demonstrate your thanks-giving tangibly. We often call this "stewardship." How can you be a good steward of the blessings God has given you through your good stewardship of and generosity with your time, talents, and treasures? How will you "do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with your God?"

At the end of my letter, I'll include some of the possible ways you can show your thanksgiving by participation in the life of the congregation. But there are many ways to serve in the community at large, as well. And, every day we are presented with opportunities to "give to show our thanksgiving." Let the Holy Spirit guide you to know how to turn your words of thanks into actions of thanksgiving.

MOBILE FOOD PANTRY

The Mobile Food Pantry served 88 households on October 19, 2023.



62 individuals ages 0-17
76 individuals ages 18-59
75 individuals ages 60+
213 total number of individuals

57 individuals visited the pantry for the 1st time.

3,681 pounds of food were distributed. Food included: peanut butter, potatoes, cheese, cottage cheese, yogurt, oatmeal, blackberries, snack bars, apples, chicken, pears, bread, and bakery.

We are hoping to get more quilts made for the veteran apartments and have some flexibility in our schedule to switch gears and make homeless veteran quilts again if they are needed. If you would like to help during our quilt work days, we meet from 9-2 every Tuesday - come for an hour or the whole day - all helpers are welcome! If sewing at home is more your speed, we have precut bundles of fabric to make 60"x80" quilt tops ready to go.

We would also like to **thank you** for your generosity in giving towards the quilt shipping fund - \$460 was donated this year!

Also, a big thank you to our anonymous donor that gave us funds to purchase many rolls of batting and other supplies - we are so grateful!!

Northern Red Oak (Quercus rubra)

Church Council Meeting Wednesday, October 11th, 6:00 p.m.

The meeting was called to order at 6:01 p.m. By Val Bach

Opening prayer was led by Pastor Bob.

Motion by Marie, seconded by Kathy to accept the agenda – motion carried.

Motion by Leon, second by Dan to accept the previous meeting minutes with a change to the person seconding the motion on the minutes the previous month. - Motion carried.

Business:

A motion by Heidi, seconded by Marie to accept the August and September Treasurer's Reports. - Motion carried. All bills for the repairs to the church are now paid. Lynette Pernsteiner informed Val that due to some personal commitments she will be unable to perform the annual audit. Val will try contacting suitable people to see who can fulfill this task.

A motion by Carrie, seconded by Dan to pay the copier contract for \$853.50 for the coming year. - Motion carried. Discussion on our current offering envelopes which need to be reordered. Decided to keep Regular/General, Mortgage (still have one), Facility Maintenance and other categories.

Collection plate discussion, decided to leave things as they are. The financial recording secretary sorts them all anyway.

Worship Team:

Bob has the pulpit supply handled through the end of the year. Barb will be doing the services on November 12 and 19. Music is selected through the end of the year...with the exception of Christmas Eve. Will see what our pulpit supply wants to suggest for that. Discussion on Advent services. Val will touch base with Our Savior's Church to discuss.

Sunday School, Confirmation and Adult Bible Study:

Sunday School is a larger group – good to see it growing. Could use more teachers and or helpers. Have been putting the announcement out there but so far, no luck.

Confirmation is good. Question about youth setting up and taking down communion. (Underage) However, there is not an issue with that legally per Ken Coyer. A couple of our 8th graders are planning a duet on November 5...and there is a skit planned for October 29.

Adult Bible study is now on track – will go 6 weeks for now, take a break and then do 6 more as there are 12 chapters to this current study.

Faithful Innovations, Fresh Expressions and Visitation Training:

FIN is really not viable at this time...replaced by Fresh Expressions. Leon stated that the other members of FIN have decided to drop off...leaving at this time just him. Pastor Bob said there is a training coming up for this program. Visitation training was held via Zoom. Val, Kim Gasek, Cathy Retzer attended. Chris Konieczny is also interested in doing visitation.

Call Committee:

Nothing new at this time. Per Pastor Bob, we will re-address what might need to be done again in January.

Roof Repair Estimates:

We have the estimates for replacement of the roof on the original church building. We will call a church congregational meeting to discuss and present the estimates. With the notice needed for a church vote, we will plan to hold the meeting Sunday, November 5, following the church service.

As a side note – the eaves troughs on the church are inadequate. Look at getting an estimate on replacing them when we are getting everything else taken care of.

New vacuum for the Custodian:

We have a request from the Custodian to replace the vacuum. Nancy will work with Dawn to select a vacuum. They are authorized to spend up to \$500. If the cost is more than that, they will bring the request to the council meeting in November.

Flower Bed Discussion:

Prior to the meeting – while still light outside – the council went out and looked at the flower bed in front of the church. It is dangerous the way it is now. Marie said she is willing to supply and replant the new bed, but the determination is to get a skid steer in and clean that all away. The cross will still stand, with the new flower bed around it. The rest will be made into lawn. We have a water issue on the east side as well. The re-vamping of the bed and possible changes to the roof and eaves troughs should alleviate this. We will look for the proper people to handle this task, but it may be tabled until spring.

Joint Parish:

Next meeting is yet to be determined. Right now, there are no changes to the financial agreements. The 5th Sunday worship is next at St. Paul's on October 29. Val asked that the council members do the egg bakes with the potluck request to fill in. Our Savior's will be bringing the beverages. This worship will be at 9:00 a.m.

Nicole Harder requested permission to hold a "TRUNK OR TREAT" in the parking lot that morning for the kids.

Permission was granted. Will also put out a box for anyone willing to donate treats.

December 31, will be a Joint Service – scheduled for BS Bar with lunch. More info to follow on that.

Pastor Bob:

Currently no changes – all going well.

Benevolences:

Discussion on giving to the synod. We had done \$2500 earlier this year. A motion by Dave, seconded by Marie to send an additional \$2500 at this time - Motion carried with one abstention.

Insurance renewal:

Leon met with the insurance person and found some cost saving measures we could employ. A motion by Dave, seconded by Dan, to make the changes to save the money on the renewal.

New Business:

The suicide support group requested the use of the building another night each month. Permission was given.

Suggestions for holding a bake sale to raise funds for global outreach. Heidi said she would organize this. Dave reminded the council that personal Action Team \$ can be donated for something like this and for any fundraiser held for the flower bed. \$250 a year per person.

Discussion regarding having a clothing collection to benefit the group from Eau Claire who came and talked to us regarding the Trafficking that is a problem in Wisconsin. We will hold collections to benefit this group. Sally will organize this project.

Our next council meeting will be November 8 at 6:00 pm.

A motion was made by Marie, seconded by Gail to adjourn – motion carried.

The council closed with the Lord's Prayer.
